2 CFR 200 and You! A Robust Discussion of Flat Fees, Sub-Recipients, and Reimbursements

NSPIRE Inspection Standard Review and Discussion

Mark Sorbo, CPD Program Manager, HUD Detroit Field Office

Mark will present information on the new residential property inspection standards and requirements associated with HUD-funded and HUD-assisted housing. He will cover introductory information related to the new inspection protocols, including changes from the previous inspection standards (HQS), NSPIRE implementation timelines, and coordination with local Public Housing Authorities and Commissions in your area. There will also be significant time following the conclusion of materials for questions and discussion with attendees.

Stop the Bleed

Anita Barksdale, BSN, RN, CPST, Injury Prevention, Education and Outreach Coordinator, Trinity Health Oakland

Injuries that result in life-threatening bleeding can happen anywhere, at any time. Uncontrolled bleeding has been found to be the major cause of preventable death in approximately 40% of people who sustain a traumatic injury. Stop the Bleed is a national campaign and call-to-action that encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives. The development of this program, a collaborative project led by the American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma (ACS COT), was influenced by world events, bleeding control lessons learned from the military, and a desire to improve survival for people with severe bleeding. In just 60 minutes, participants will learn the basics of bleeding control, along with hands-on practice of compression through wound management and tourniquet application. A completion certificate is offered at the end of the course.
